C onducting research is one form of education. A quote from Former USA President John F. Kennedy is "let us think of education as the means of developing our greatest abilities, because in each of us there is a private hope and dream which, fulfilled, can be translated into benefit for everyone." This editorial letter is dedicated to all of those persons conducting surgical healthcare oriented research.
